

Using Rideshare Applications Abroad

Using rideshare applications (e.g., Uber, Lyft, etc.) can be a safe and reliable transportation option in many locations. However, before your travel, you need to do your research. To help inform your decision, speak to a trusted host or individuals that have experience in your destination country. You can also visit the "Travel and Transportation" section on the Country Information Page of your destination's <u>U.S. Department of State travel advisory</u> for more information about road travel.

Follow these guidelines if you decide to use a rideshare application:

- Research the use of rideshares at your destination to determine if using a service is a safe and suitable option.
- Check online reviews to learn about local app services. Speak to friends or trusted hosts about their experiences.
- Only use a dispatch application if it provides vehicle description, license plate number, and the driver's name, picture, and user rating.
- Verify you can pre-confirm the price, vehicle, and driver on the rideshare application. Read the reviews of your assigned driver if available.
- Meet rideshare vehicles in public, well-lit locations.
- Before entering the vehicle, verify the information provided, including the vehicle make/model, license plate number, and driver's name/picture.
- Look inside the vehicle before entering. If anything seems odd or questionable (e.g., there are unexpected passengers in the car), do not enter.



- Always ride in the back seat of the vehicle, behind the driver.
- Once you enter the vehicle, verify you can close and re-open the vehicle door.
- Always wear a seatbelt.
- Only use rideshares with other passengers you know—do NOT use pooling options.
- During the ride, follow the route on your cell phone's map application.
 Update friends with your location.
- Have the phone numbers of friends, hosts, and local emergency services available in case of an emergency.
